Styrofoam (Dart Container) 310 N. Evergreen, North Aurora, 24/7; Electronics 517 E. Fabyan Parkway, Batavia; Hazardous Household Material 156 Fort Hill Drive, Naperville (open 9am-2pm Sat./Sun). Recyclable items (electronics, clothing, books, paper, cardboard, fabric items and scrap metal) can be taken to the parking lot of ACE HARDWARE, 994 N. LAKE ST FROM 9AM-1PM **EVERY SATURDAY.** 

For review, items that **cannot be recycled** include plastic bags & wraps, wire, ropes, textiles, shoes, scrap metal, food, liquid 1953, batteries, needles & cords. ## **ILLINOIS HISTORICAL SITES**

THE ILLINOIS-MICHIGAN CANAL was constructed from 1836-1848. Work was delayed for a couple of years due to the Great Economic Panic of 1837. The Canal allowed water travel from the

Great Lakes to the Illinois River, to the Mississippi River and finally to the Gulf of Mexico. The Canal ran 96 miles from Chicago Bridgeport to LaSalle-Peru. Its dimensions were 60 feet wide and 6 feet deep with mule towpaths along side. 17 Locks & 4 Aqueducts were needed. Funding was through the selling of donated Federal Land as well as State Bonds. The cost at the time was \$6,170,226. The IMC was challenged by the railroads and later the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal. However the IMC operated until 1933. It became a National Heritage Site in 1984. Lions Clubs located along the IMC include Sumit, Willow Springs, Lemont, Romeoville, Lockport, Joliet, Seneca, and Channahon.
